EFFECTS OF ROADLESS CONSERVATION IN COLORADO

National Forests in Colorado

 Colorado contains a total of 14,509,000 acres of national forest land, about 21.8 percent of Colorado's landmass.

National Forests in Colorado include:

The Arapaho, Grand Mesa, Uncompandere, Gunnison, Pawnee, Pike, Rio Grande, Roosevelt, Routt, San Isabel, San Juan, and White River National Forests.

Inventoried Roadless Area Acreage:

 Colorado's national forests contain 4,433,000 acres of inventoried roadless areas (IRAs), about 30.5% of all national forest land in the state.¹

Impacts on Logging

 The total estimated reduction in annual logging in IRAs in Colorado is 2.8 million board feet, a 6% reduction from recent historic harvest on national forest lands.²

Job Impacts


• The estimated statewide reduction in employment related to timber harvest from IRAs in Colorado is 16 jobs.³

Forest Plans

 Current Forest Service management plans in Colorado prohibit road construction and reconstruction on 936,000 acres, or 21.1% of all IRAs. Road building is allowed on the other 3,498,000 acres, or 78.9%.⁴

Public Involvement and Support

 The Forest Service held 18 public meetings throughout Colorado during the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) comment period on the development of the Roadless Area Conservation Rule.⁵



National Forests in Colorado

- Nationwide, the Forest Service held more than 600 public hearings during the development of the Roadless Area Conservation Rule.
- More than 1.6 million Americans submitted comments in support of protecting roadless areas, including nearly 1.2 million comments during the DEIS comment period. Of these 1.2 million comments, 95.9% supported the complete protection of all roadless areas.
- The Forest Service received 36,331 comments from residents of Colorado during the DEIS comment period. Of these 36,331 comments, 91.9% supported the complete protection of all roadless areas. ⁶
- A March 2000 public opinion poll conducted by Ridder/Braden found that 75% of Colorado residents supported the complete protection of these last remaining wild areas of their national forests.
